



## What Every Arizona Voter Should Know

### Registration Deadline

Arizona's deadline to register to vote is Monday, October 5, 2020.

### Requesting to Vote By Mail?

The deadline to request to Vote By Mail is Friday, October 23, 2020 by 5pm. You can join the permanent early voting list (PEVL) or make a one-time vote-by-mail request.

### Early Voting Dates

Counties have different early on-site voting options October 7 – 30, 2020. Contact your County Recorder directly to learn more about in-person early voting options. You can look up your County Recorder's website at <https://azsos.gov/county-election-info>.

### Election Day

Election Day is November 3, 2020 and the polls are open from 6am to 7pm. If you are in line when the polls close, you are entitled to vote.

### Vote-By-Mail Ballot Return

Whether you drop off it off at any polling place in your county or mail it back, mail-in ballots must be received by 7pm on Election Day.

### Vote-By-Mail Requirements

Place your vote-by-mail ballot in the pre-paid envelope provided with your ballot package. You can track the status of your ballot at [My.Arizona.Vote](https://my.arizona.vote) to confirm that it was received and counted. Voters in Maricopa County can receive automatic updates on their ballot status via text. Text the word "JOIN" to 628-683 or visit [TextSignUp.Maricopa.Vote](https://textsignup.maricopa.vote) to subscribe.

### Voting in Person

If you are voting in person, you need to show ID, but it does not need to include your photo. You could provide one of the following Photo IDs: Valid Arizona driver's license; Valid Arizona non-operating identification card; Tribal enrollment card or other form of Tribal identification; or Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification.

If your ID does not include your photo, you could provide **two** of the following: Utility bill of the voter that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election for electric, gas, water, solid waste, sewer, telephone, cellular phone or cable television; Bank or credit union statement that is dated within 90 days of the date of the election; Valid Arizona vehicle registration; Indian census card; Property tax statement of the voter's residence; Tribal enrollment card or other form of Tribal identification; Arizona vehicle insurance card; Recorder's Certificate; Valid United States federal, state, or local government issued identification, including a voter registration card issued by the County Recorder; or Any mailing to the voter marked "Official Election Material."

If you are unable to provide valid ID, you can still cast a provisional ballot. This will be counted after you bring valid ID to your polling location before 7pm on Election Day, or to your County Recorder's Office within 5 business days.
